#### **Environmental and Ethical Considerations in Modern Pilgrimages:**

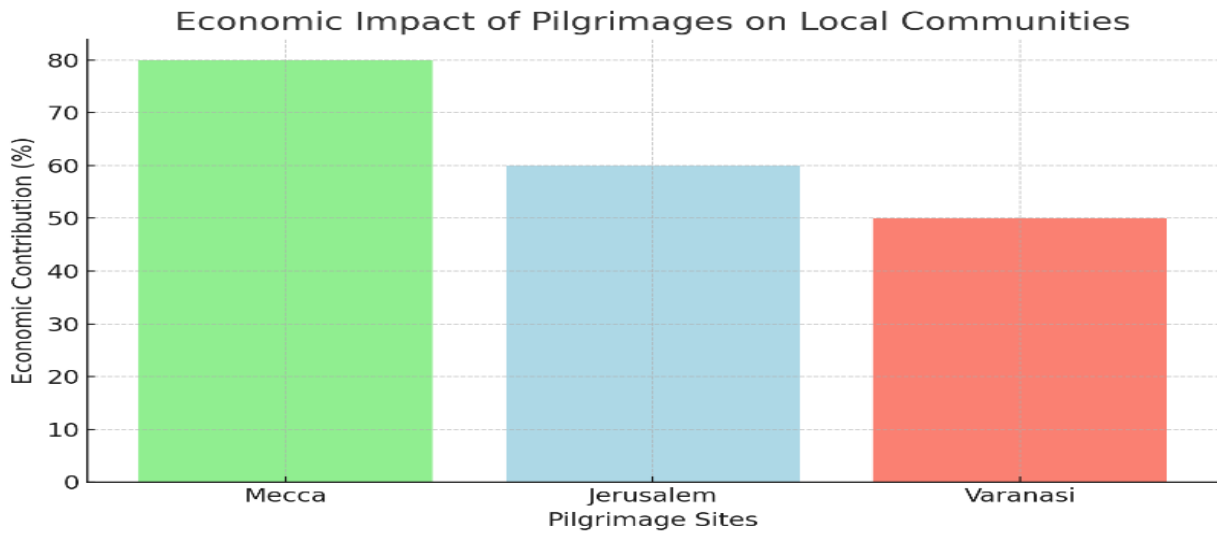

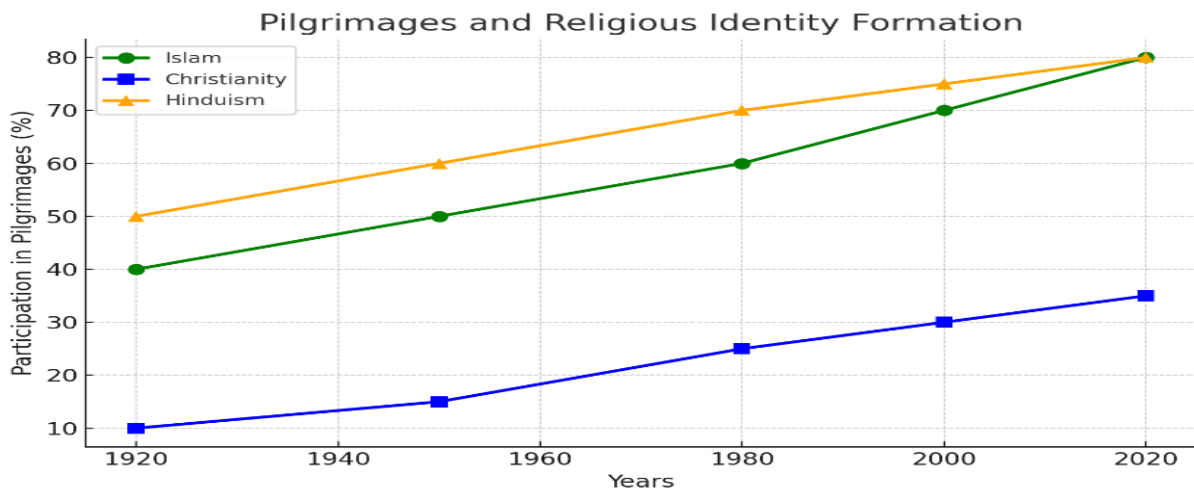
